**Bishop Robert Innes** has published a Message for Europe Day (9th May)

In it he speaks about the contributions of Anglicans and other faith leaders to encourage Covid Vaccination campaigns across Europe.

He refers to the "Gee Seven" songs recorded by the young choristers of Truro Cathedral hopefully to be sung to global leaders at the G7 conference. He speaks about reducing plastic waste, a sustainability project in Italy, the national Church net zero carbon targets., racial injustice, child refugees.

He expresses concerns over the hindrance of religious expression and our ability to organise Church life in Europe. 'We will remain both vocal and vigilant against the efforts that seek to constrain the voice of faith in civil society, wherever we can across Europe where we consider ourselves as honoured guests.

#### He concludes:

"We are a bridging Church and we will remain one, reaching across boundaries of the forty-two countries that make up our diocese;

We are European Anglicans, working closely alongside our ecumenical and faith partners, engaging actively across the European Institutions, and committed to playing our full part in the common interest that is building together the future of Europe"

# Easter Ascension What now?

We are between the feast of Ascension (last Thursday) and the feast of Pentecost (next Sunday)

One of the great gifts that the Church gives us is the Liturgical Calendar. Its purpose is not only to remind us of the marvellous plan of salvation, but also for us to be present in each of the saving mysteries of Christ. With this in mind, the Lord is inviting us during this time to go in heart and mind to the Upper Room with the Apostles and to await the Gift of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost. Those gathered must have found themselves reflecting deeply on the mystery of Our Lord's Ascension and why it was necessary for Him to go so that He could send the Holy Spirit (John 16:7). While we join them in prayer, it is expedient that we too meditate on this necessity.

Jesus did not "leave" His disciples - He went to a different place. After 40 days of Resurrection appearances, things coudn't just peter out - there had to be a culmination. Earth is our dimension: Heaven is His. Our eyes may not be able to perceive the spiritual realm, but He – fully God and fully man - has returned to the Father. He has gone ahead, foreshadowing the path –that all Christians will one day take. He is, as he promised, preparing a place for us.

He hasn't just disappeared, never to be involved with His disciples - or us - again. He will return. It is interesting to read again the Acts account of the ten days between Ascension and Pentecost. We might have expected it to be a time of slightly stunned disorientation. Jesus has gone, and although He has promised this "Holy Spirit" the Spirit hasn't yet been given. We might have expected them to have been a bit lost.

But there is no mention of fearfulness, unease or disbelief. There is a boldness. The inner group of disciples is recorded as "constantly devoting themselves to prayer" – not just among themselves but involving (from the start) Mary, and Jesus' brothers.

And so, when Pentecost came they were ready.

In the meantime, they waited and they trusted and they prayed

Do we? Are we?

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# **THY KINGDOM COME**

In the days between Ascension and Pentecost, we are committing ourselves to pray for friends and family to come to know the love, hope and peace found in Christ.

#### Before you start

- Prayerfully *choose five people* to pray for, and pray during these 11 days that they would know the transforming love of Christ.
- Set a time each day when you will take a moment of prayer. You only need about 10 minutes.
- Set a reminder on your phone, a note on your fridge or somewhere visible to prompt you to pray each day

Father, thank you for your love:
draw my family and friends into that love.
Jesus, thank you for your gift of yourself:
help them to accept and appreciate that gift.
Holy Spirit, give them new life, and bring them home.

CHRONOLOGICAL BIBLE This is a challenge/opportunity in which we have set out to read the whole Bible in one year. The readings suggested for each day are set in chronological order, as they happened or as they were written. Some passages repeat others but that's because no one person sat down to write the whole Bible at one go. With 66 books and maybe more than 40 writers, we have here a way of viewing God's written Word in a whole new way - KEEP IT UP!

#### FRENCH RESIDENCY

#### Advice to British people living in the UK

More help for UK Nationals in France to apply for residency is on the way, with a decision to extend project funding for the Diocese in Europe Residency Support Project to the end of 2021. The Foreign, Commonwealth and Development Office has announced an additional £1 million in funding to residency support projects in its UK National Support Fund (UKNSF) Programme. This includes more funding for the diocese project, launched in September 2020 with a £250,000 grant. The project provides free help and support to UK Nationals applying for residency in France under the EU Exit Withdrawal Agreement.

Apply now for a Withdrawal Agreement Residency Permit, even if you already have a carte de séjour. All UK nationals need to have this new permit, unless they have a second EU nationality.

The French authorities have stated that all UK nationals wishing to retain their French residency rights will have until June 30 2021 to apply, and that they should be in possession of their new permit by 1 October.

So far, approximately 125,000 UK Nationals and their family members have applied. However, the estimated numbers of British in France vary from around 150,000 to over 400,000, indicating there are at least tens of thousands who have still to apply.
