ADVENT

The Church in France had initiated a penitential season near the end of the calendar year early in the fourth century. It developed out of the need to better address the sheer volume of people who were clamouring to join the Church and who needed instruction before their baptism.

The Church began celebrating a season of Advent specifically as preparation for the feast of Christmas under the influence of Pope Gregory I who developed a liturgy, a 'rite of prayer' around the theme of John the Baptist's words "Prepare the way of the Lord".

Our preparation today is not about shopping for bargain presents or the best food and wine. We sing "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel".

'U' is for Unity

From the earliest times there has been disunity in the Church. In his first letter to the Corinthians, Paul complains about factions in that congregation. Read 1 Corinthians Chapter 1, verses 10-16. The modern movement towards unity, the Ecumenical Movement, takes its starting point from the Edinburgh Missionary Conference of 1910 AD. This conference was concerned about the impact of Christian division on the missionary work-taking place in Africa and Asia. Two themes emerged from this conference; firstly under the title 'Life and Work' the impact of Christianity on economic, social and political systems was discussed.

Secondly under the title 'Faith and Order' the delegates looked at the nature of the Church, its beliefs and its structure, especially its Unity or rather *Disunity*. For nearly thirty years these two themes became movements within the Christian Churches until in 1937 they joined together and the "World Council of Churches" was formed. The World Council of Churches, with its headquarters in Geneva, is now that "fellowship of Churches which accept our Lord Jesus Christ as our God and Saviour". Movements towards unity have taken place within this period; for example, in the UK we have had the union of English Presbyterians with the Congregational Church to form the United Reformed Church. In India unity has created the Church of North India (Anglicans, Methodists, Baptists and other groups).

In the Early years of Christianity the emphasis was on '*what should Christians believe?*' and disunity flowed from different ideas of this problem until the Church produced a definitive Creed or belief statement. Later in the Middle Ages the arguments shifted to '*what is the nature of the Church?*'. So we had the great divides between how the Church should be governed, by the Pope, by the King, or even by a group of individuals.

Lutherans, Anglicans, Presbyterians grew out of this conflict.

Today the mood has changed yet again and people are asking 'What does it mean to be a human being? After the Second World War there was a period of decolonisation, where new Nations came into existence in Africa. Asia. the Caribbean and Oceania. These nations had their own Churches with their own priorities that were not the same as those of the traditional Churches in the West and East of Europe. They were Churches with no experience of the Reformation. With such issues as abortion, gay rights, economic issues, women's rights, racism etc., new possibilities for division are even greater than they were before. At both ends of the Catholic/Protestant spectrum there is the possibility for division between those who favour a more fundamental approach to those of the more liberal Christian communities. Such are the problems of Christian Unity and they should not be understated: people are so different and come from such a variety of backgrounds. However, Unity is at the heart of the Christian life and we should all be striving to find ways in which we can worship and act together. Such is Jesus' desire for His Church and so it should be a desire of every Christian believer.

Lord Jesus, you said to your Apostles "Peace I leave with you my peace I give unto you". Regard not our sins but the faith of your Church and grant her that peace and unity that in accordance with Your will. This we ask through Jesus the Lord....Amen

Firstly, the purchase of our building has been finalised and the little Chapel in Chef Boutonne will now be known as the **Church of Christ the Good Shepherd**. We have written to Bishop Robert asking if he would visit our area during his tour of Southwest France next year, so that we can hold a special Consecration Service.

A group of volunteers are going in on the 4th of December to give an initial good clean of the building and dispose of the bits and pieces left behind by the previous owner.

We will then require two people who would be willing to go in once a month to give the Church a **once over**.

We also need two people to act as Local Wardens.

So hopefully we will be able to rehearse an advent Anthem for the opening service of our new Church. Further occasions would be Good Friday, Easter, Advent, Christmas and possibly weddings.
