







Collects

Almighty and everlasting God, you have given us your servants grace, by the confession of a true faith, to acknowledge the glory of the eternal Trinity and in the power of the divine majesty to worship the Unity: keep us steadfast in this faith, that we may evermore be defended from all adversities; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

Holy God, faithful and unchanging: enlarge our minds with the knowledge of your truth, and draw us more deeply into the mystery of your love, that we may truly worship you, Father, Son and Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.


Almighty and eternal God, you have revealed yourself as Father, Son and Holy Spirit, and live and reign in the perfect unity of love: hold us firm in this faith, that we may know you in all your ways and evermore rejoice in your eternal glory, who are three Persons yet one God, now and for ever.

Trinity Sunday commemorates and honours not an event, but a **reality**: the Holy Trinity.

Three in One and One in Three



It was *St. Patrick*, a Christian missionary, who used a shamrock (clover) to explain the Holy Trinity.

He said the three leaves stand for the three beings of God, God the Father, God the Son and God the Holy Spirit and the stem shows how they are united into one.

The three leaves of a shamrock are also said to stand for faith, hope and love.



Trinity Sunday

Unlike other festivals in the church's liturgical calendar, Trinity Sunday centres on a *doctrine* of the church, rather than an *event*. It celebrates the unfathomable mystery of God's being as Holy Trinity. It is a day of adoration and praise of the one, eternal, incomprehensible God.

Trinity Sunday, in a sense, synthesizes all we have celebrated over the past months which have concentrated on God's mighty acts: Christmas-Epiphany celebrating God's taking flesh and dwelling among us in Jesus Christ; Easter celebrating Christ's death and resurrection for us; Pentecost celebrating God the Holy Spirit becoming our Sanctifier, Guide, and Teacher. It is, therefore, a fitting transition to that part of the year when Sunday by Sunday the work of God among us is unfolded in a more general way.

The triune God is the basis of all we are and do as Christians. In the name of this triune God we are baptized. As the baptized ones we bear the name of the triune God in our being. We are of the family of the triune God. We affirm this parentage when, in reciting the creeds, we say what we believe. Our discipleship is rooted in the mighty acts of this triune God who is active in redeeming the world.

The triune God is the basis of all our prayers — We pray *to* God the Father, *through* Jesus Christ, *by* the Holy Spirit. The Trinity holds central place in our faith.

In celebrating Trinity Sunday, remember that every Lord's Day is consecrated to the triune God. On the first day of the week, God began creation. On the first day of the week, God raised Jesus from the grave. On the first day of the week, the Holy Spirit descended on the newly born church. Every Sunday is special. Every Sunday is a day of the Holy Trinity.

SANDY' CHURCH ALPHABET

O is for Orders.

No, not the Marching kind but the Holy kind. In the Prayer Book of 1662 the Anglican Church opted for a threefold ministry of Bishops, Priests, and Deacons and produced services whereby these 'Orders' of clergy should be ordained. In fact the Prayer book wording is that Deacons are made, Priests are 'ordained' and Bishops are 'consecrated'.

After the ascension of Jesus came the gift of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost then St Peter assumed charge of the early Christians (Acts 1:15), and he suggested a replacement for Judas. The number of the twelve apostles was maintained and Matthias was elected. Peter is foremost in addressing the crowd after the events of Pentecost (Acts 2:37). In Acts 4 Peter and John are brought before the chief priests and the Sanhedrin and again it is Peter who leads, the rock on which Jesus will build the Church. (Matthew 16:13-20).

In Acts 6 we read of the ordination of seven deacons to assist the apostles, including Stephen the first martyr. Further in Acts (13:1-5) we read of Barnabas and Paul (Saul) being ordained by the laying on of hands with prayer for missionary work.

Paul gives a speech at Miletus (Acts 20:28) in which he mentions Bishops. (In Greek *Episkopoi*.) In Paul's first letter to Timothy chapter 3 there is mention both of presbyters (Priests) and deacons. From a reading of the book of the Acts of the Apostles it would seem that the ministry of the Church was divided between those who were missionaries and those who were appointed to maintain the faith in the newly established communities. (Acts 14:30 and 1 Timothy 5 17-22).

By the third century the three-fold ministry was well established with a plethora of others known as the Minor Orders. These included such titles as subdeacon, lector, exhorsist, and even doorkeeper. But by the time of the late Middle Ages the reformers, in England, opted for the three "major" orders of Bishop, Priest and Deacon. One could say, however, that the Bishop is a Priest who has special responsibility and who needs other priests to act in parishes on his (or her) behalf.

Today there is a thought that every Christian is by definition a priest, this follows from the passage (1 Peter 2:4-10) which contains the words "You are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a consecrated Nation. If we are all priests then the difference between clergy and laity is one of *order*, that things should be done with reverence, dignity and a due sense of propriety. So the celebrant is called the president and his, or her, task, is to be shepherd of the people, to lead the worship and to tend to the spiritual needs of the community.

If we all share Christ's priesthood we are all committed to receive the sacrament by prayer and thanksgiving, to lead holy lives and to be actively engaged in seeking the poor, the lonely and the distressed and having sought them, care for them.

Father, you have appointed your Son Jesus Christ eternal High Priest.

Guide those he has chosen to be ministers of word and sacrament and help them to be faithful in fulfilling the ministry they have received.

Grant this through Jesus the Lord.......Amen

Are you WARPed yet?

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Don't forget!

- If you are a British citizen (with a UK Passport)
- If you have lived in France (or plan to live) for more than 90 days
- you have until the end of June to apply for your WARP, that is your Withdrawal
 Agreement Residency Permit. Even if you have a previous Carte de Séjour, you
 must apply for this post-Brexit permit. It's the law.

You can apply online at <u>contacts-demarches.interieur.gouv.fr</u>

If you need advice or help, contact your local Mairie, or Préfecture or France Service office.

The new card, though marked "permanent", gives you the right of Residency in France for the next 10 years.

There is also help available, should you need it, set up by the C of E Diocese of Europe in conjunction with the British governmental authorities.
